It is Good to be Wise

PROVERBS 16:16. NIV

f there was a wisdom test, how would you score? You can be very knowledgeable about many things but massively lack wisdom. Wisdom is applying knowledge correctly. There is a well-known quote that states that "knowledge is knowing what to say and wisdom is knowing when to say it."

Most of us have run into foolish or silly people who continually make ill-advised decisions. Perhaps, at one time, you were in that category. How can we help people become wiser and how can we help ourselves?

The Bible offers us a book just for that purpose. The book is Proverbs. In this article I have chosen seven areas addressed in this book that if heeded and practiced will surely make one wiser.

1. Getting the right guidance in life is critical if you are going to be wise. One of the chief verses in Proverbs is found in chapter 3, verses 5-6: "Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge Him and He will make your paths straight."

All of the Bible offers us instruction and guidance and we truly need it because, "There is a way that seems right to a man, but in the end leads to death." (14:12)

We often ask ourselves, which way we are to go. One direction the book of Proverbs repeatedly warns us not to take is the path that leads to adultery. "But a man who commits adultery lacks judgment; whoever does so destroys himself." (6:32) More bluntly is the proverb that asks, "Can a man scoop fire into his lap without his clothes being burned..." (6:27) comparing this to committing adultery.

Do people see you and others as "full of themselves"? They are the people who always think they are right and want others to know it. Proverbs tells us that, "the Lord detests all the proud of heart..." (16:5) and that pride goes before a fall (16:18). Humility in all things is advised. And, if you did something well, let another praise you and you keep your mouth shut. But at the same time remember, "a person will be tested by the praise they receive." (27:21)

3. Some of the most unwise actions we can take has to do with our speech. "When words are many, sin is not

> absent..." (10:19) Also, "He who guards his lips guards his life; but he who speaks rashly will come to ruin. (13:3) "A gossip betrays a confidence; so avoid a man who talks too much." (20:19) On the other hand, graceful speech is praised, "A honest answer is like a kiss on the lips." (24:26)

> 4. If you have ever read the book of Proverbs there is one image you probably remember. It has to do with ants. "Go to the ant you sluggard; consider its ways and be wise." (6:6) Laziness is a sure sign that one lacks wisdom. According to

the Proverbs it is a more serious problem than most realize. "One who is slack in his work is a brother to one who destroys." (18:8)

5. As Jesus often noted, the foolish often make money their god. The Proverbs give the same warning. "Whoever trusts in riches will fall..." (11:28) declares Solomon, perhaps the richest man who ever lived. People who pursue them ought to consider this nugget of wisdom: "Do not wear yourself out to get rich; have the wisdom to show restraint. Cast but a glance at riches, and they are gone for they will sprout wings

and fly off to the sky like an eagle." (23:4-5)

- 6. The Proverbs have much to say about personal relationships. Here are a few examples.
 - "A fool shows his annoyance at once, but a prudent man overlooks an insult." (12:16)
 - "He who covers over an offense promotes love, but whoever repeats the matter separates close friends." (17:9)
 - "He who loves to quarrel loves sin..." (7:19)
 "If your enemy is hungry, give him food to eat, if he is thirsty, give him water to drink..." (25:21)
- 7. If you are to be wise, the Bible teaches us, you must have a sincere concern for the poor. There are many, many verses in the Proverbs that say just that.

"He who mocks the poor shows contempt for their Maker." (17:5)

"He who is kind to the poor lends to the Lord, and He will reward him for what he has done." (10:17) "If a man shut his ears to the cry of the poor, he too will cry out and not be answered." (21:13)

"Do not exploit the poor...for the Lord will take up their cause..." (22:22-23)

May you heed the wisdom of the Proverbs because . . . It is good to be wise!

In the Beginning Was the Word

read, "In the beginning was the Word..." and probably do not suspect all that is behind it. In summary, it is personified and refers to the creative intelligence that made and sustains the universe. As you continue reading John 1 you learn this creative intelligence Who always existed, always was took on flesh and became our Redeemer. Our Creator is also our Redeemer, is Jesus. The Word was a concept familiar to both Jews and Greeks, even if slightly different in the understanding of both. Because Word was familiar to both groups, John's Gospel could better find an audience with both.

"Word" translates 'Logos.' While "Word" is an accurate literal translation, it also misses so much more that is a part of 'Logos.' "Logos" is more than a vocable, like "tree" or "love" or "day." As Greeks like Aristotle understood the 'Logos,' it referred to ordered discourse that is part of a carefully argued presentation. For the Stoics it came to be the divine reasoning that put the universe in order. "In Greek thought, the logos was the rational principle guiding the universe and making life coherent."*

Philo was an educated Jew and a philosopher from Alexandria born about twenty years before Jesus and dying about forty years after Jesus' ministry on earth. He was acquainted with Stoicism and easily connected it with God's Wisdom in the creation of all things when He called all things into being by the power of His spoken Word. "For Jewish people, the Logos was the word of the Lord, an ex-

pression of God's wisdom and creative power. By Jesus' time, the Logos was viewed as coming from God and having His personality (see Ps 33:6, 9; Prov 8:22-31); John affirmed this understanding (John 1:14)."*

In John 1:3 we read that all created things were made through the 'Logos.' That is repeated in verse 10. Verses 11 and 12 identify the One Who created as the One Who also redeems and gives authority to be children of God. (John uses the word "son" for Jesus, but "children" for us.) Yet, many do not recognize Him and do not receive Him or what He offers.

This One Who created and redeems became flesh and identified with those whom He created. In our English Bibles we read that He dwelt among us. The verb used means to pitch a tent. The Old Testament usage of that verb is important. In the Greek Septuagint (Old Testament) known to most by virtue of the conquests of Alexander the Great that spread the Greek language across the empire that word refers to the Tabernacle, or Tent of Meeting where God, Himself came to be present with His people. Jesus is the presence of God among us. He is the Word.

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Mission for Christ Network (MCN)

ambodian Lutheran Pastor Phan Narit (Jesse) and his wife Chin Sithon (Naomi) direct the ministry of Stronghold Cambodia, a partner organization of Mission of Christ Network. Stronghold provides a safe place for economically disadvantaged children in their Buddhist and Muslim community to be nurtured intellectually, physically, and spiritually through their lunch program, Bible devotions, ESL, and basic computer classes. Their mission (based on Isaiah 25:4) is to proclaim the Gospel to children and families so they can come to know God as their Stronghold, Shelter, and Shade. Four missionaries sent by Mission of Christ Network serve with Stronghold Cambodia.

In a recent newsletter, Pastor Jesse tells this story:

"In 2019, God sent us Sinoun to be our cook. She had a little exposure to Christianity through her cousin who introduced her to Stronghold Cambodia. However, despite occasionally attending a local church, she did not understand the teaching of the ten commandments, the necessity of the water baptism, and Holy Communion. Then in 2021, God sent Lin to be our computer teacher. Although Lin informed Jesse that he knew nothing about Jesus, Stronghold decided to hire him hoping that the Holy Spirit would work in his heart so that he would receive God as his personal Lord and Savior.

Both Sinoun and Lin have been exposed daily to the good news of Jesus in both word and action while working at Stronghold. They have heard Bible story devotions in their heart language of Khmer and prayers throughout the day as we call upon God to praise, thank and ask for His help. Jesse, Naomi and our MCN volunteers have worked at building relationships with them through care and kindness while looking for opportunities to intentionally proclaim the Gospel to each of them personally. As their interest and participation in singing praise songs and praying grew, Jesse offered to personally teach them more about God's love and grace.

We give praise and glory to God for the work of the Holy Spirit in their hearts. On April 7, both Sinoun and Lin were baptized in the Triune God. Jesse continues to teach the small catechism to them so they may

grow stronger in faith and knowledge of Him."

To love God with "all your mind" (Mark 12:30), find an adult Bible study or small group that dives into Scripture. Then humbly wear the label of lifelong learner, knowing that God still has new things to teach even the most seasoned Christian.

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A Devotion on Disasters

ear family and friends, once again we are confronted with a catastrophic disaster, this time in Lahaina, Hawaii with the death toll now at 96 and climbing and billions of dollars lost in the destruction of property. Let me share some Biblical thoughts on this.

- 1. Sometimes something like this is beyond human comprehension. In this life we are not given all the answers to all the questions that can be raised.
- 2. In the midst of disaster many people have a way of saying, "Well, this proves that God is not in control, and maybe He doesn't even exist." The Bible says quite the opposite that our God is in control (Psalm 103:8) and that in Him all things hold together (Colossians 1:15-17). Our finite minds just cannot comprehend what God has in mind behind these circumstances.
- 3. God is indeed all-present, all-powerful, all-knowing and we are called upon to confess that God is love and that He does care for His creation. His love is clearly seen in His desired plan of salvation of all people in Jesus Christ (John 3:16-17).
- 4. However, we must avoid trying to explain what God has not explained. We know that all suffering finds its source in sin, but we don't know if a particular sin was the cause of this disaster. The Bible reminds us that God's judgments are unsearchable and unfathomable (Romans 11:33).
- 5. Jesus has warned us in Matthew 24 that famines and earthquakes and other ominous phenomena would be the "birth pangs" of the coming Judgment. To be ready for that Day means to be in a right relationship with God now and to live with a desire to share the Good News with others.
- 6. The effects of sin are all around us in the evidences of sickness, suffering and death. Every disaster is a merciful call to repentance for all of us (Luke 13:1-5). So the real question in calamity is not "Why?" but rather "What are You saying to me in this?"
- 7. The Christian is called to "weep with those who weep," and in Christ's name respond with His love and mercy. We must offer prayer, sympathy and generosity to those in need. Matthew 25 teaches us to feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, and clothe the naked in Christ's name.
- 8. Major disasters are a prelude of the cataclysm that is yet to come. Everything is to be viewed in terms of eternity. Let us witness boldly to the Gospel of Jesus Christ—the only way to find real life and victory out of sin and death. Jesus says to us: "My grace is sufficient for you, for My strength is made perfect in weakness" (II Corinthians 12:9).

Eating Carrots Protects from Pollution

Scientists at the University of Delaware discovered that eating more apiaceous vegetables, which include carrots, celery, parsley, and parsnips can help protect against the negative effects of air pollution. Lab tests found that this specific vegetable family protects the body from acrolein accumulation, which is present in large amounts in both cigarette smoke and automobile exhaust, and triggers oxidative stress. Researchers calculated the amount of vegetables needed for the beneficial effect. Researcher Jae Kyeom Kim, PhD., said, "We determined that the actual daily calorie amount of apiaceous vegetables for humans is roughly one and one-third cups a day. It doesn't require a high intake to see a difference, and this is an achievable amount in daily life."
